My career has been primarily in publishing, providing editorial and translation expertise to several publishers as well as establishing my own publishing partnership to work with cultural institutions in Russia. We have published many of the books on contemporary art that formed the core of the Hermitage 20/21 project – the museum's initiative to bring contemporary artists, from Antony Gormley to Zhang Huan, to St Petersburg. We received a British Academy grant for an oral-history project at the Hermitage, as well as a fellowship from the Likhachev Foundation to encourage cultural links between Russia and the UK. I have worked on projects in Iran, Egypt and Saudi Arabia, and spent a significant amount of time in Eastern Europe. Since moving back to the North East of England, I have continued to combine publishing projects with freelance work and translation.
